In the spirit of cooperation and helping people stay connected, Hope Lutheran has agreed to share its Facebook page with Grace Lutheran. One page will make it easier on Pastor Helgren to share messages and information with both congregations. Additionally, it will help our community remain connected moving forward.

We posted video sermons from Pastor on Sunday morning (3/22/2020) and Wednesday evening (3/25/2020). In the future, we hope to be able to go “live” in different contexts — it could be Pastor talking to both Congregations in a virtual church service, a congregation member conducting a mini-Sunday school class, etc. Feel free to send a message to the page or contact one of the page administrators directly—Jane Antholz (Hope) and Erin Ebeler Rolf (Grace).

If you’re on Facebook, please share information about the churches’ page on your own Facebook page and invite your friends to join the group. Don’t forget to invite “kids” or former community members who have moved away. We hope that in addition to keeping people up to speed on church matters, this page can serve as a source of support for everyone and a reminder that God’s Love, Hope, and Grace are always there for us!

So far, the response to the page has been amazing. Between Friday, March 20 and Wednesday, March 25:

- 86 new people have “liked” the page, bringing the total followers of the page to 229 people
- More than 2,100 unique individuals saw at least one post from the page in that time period. Most of those people are likely followers of the page or the friends/family of those individuals. It could have been a sermon, a posting about a service opportunity re: sewing masks for hospitals, or an informational post. But, in any case, information about our churches and God’s message in a difficult time is being broadcast.
- More than 600 people watched at least some portion of Pastor’s March 22nd sermon.
- More than 30 surgical masks have been sewn by members of the congregations for distribution to Johnson County Hospital (primary recipient) and UNMC / Children’s Hospital. More individuals have stated that they will also be making masks as well. The pattern to make masks is posted on the page, and there is also an instructional link on how to make them included in the posting. If you want to make masks, but need supplies, contact Erin. Hard copies of the pattern were also set in Grace’s basement if that is easier for someone to view the pattern.

If you have ideas for content for the page, please reach out to Jane or Erin. We’re hoping that someone will create some fun videos that could be put up for children in the community. For example, maybe you want to host a 10 minute sing-a-long while you play the guitar or a piano. You could show kids how to make a simple craft using items around the house. We’re only limited by our imaginations, and parents will be grateful for safe content that can keep home-bound kids busy for awhile. If you need help with your idea, let us know. If we can help in a socially-distanced manner, we will!

Grace Lutheran Church Council met 17 March 2020. The meeting was called to order by Paul Wilken. Pastor Jim Helgren started the meeting with a prayer. Council members present were Caleb Eggleston, Paul Wilken, Amber Beard, Richard Roesener, Robin Eggleston, and Gene Ekhoﬀ. Also, in attendance were Jim Helgren and Diane Wilken.

Robin Eggleston made a motion to accept the minutes of the 18 February 2020 meeting. Richard Roesener seconded. Motion carried.

The financial report was reviewed. The account balances as of 28 February 2020 are:

Current: \$6,315.66	Memorial: \$13,854.21
Improvement: \$7,367.06	Luther League: \$4,163.56

Richard Roesener made a motion to accept the treasurer's report. Caleb Eggleston seconded. Motion carried.

Pastor Helgren's Monthly Report:

Pastor Helgren provided his list of congregational visits for the month of February. He will have worship at Belle Terrace (27 April 2020 at 10 am) and Linden View (22 April 2020 at 2pm).

We will be cancelling Lenten Services, as well as Thursday luncheons until further notice.

Wedding at Hope 2 May 2020 will be held.

A thank you letter was received from Mission Support from the Nebraska Synod 2019 (Fiscal year February 1 to January 30).

Committee Reports:

Property committee: Council – Gene Ekhoﬀ

Lights are done, fixtures were replaced, and bulbs were added/replaced.

Sink in the storeroom was discussed, regarding if it was needed or not.

Plaster on the walls of the bell tower are falling down and needing to be replaced (with a bid of \$2,5000 -\$3,2000) ELCA ladies have raised some of the money to cover repairs. Upon completion, the walls will need painted.

Gene Ekhoﬀ made motion to move forward with this process (plaster repair and painting).

Remote for the parsonage garage opener needs replaced, and motion light set up.

Additionally, when the weather warms up the parsonage and the propane tanks power washed and painted.

Meeting was called together to discuss the new Facebook page, online church services, communion, and the balcony wall repair and painting.

The Facebook page has been well received and assistance for those who do not have access to Facebook will be allowed through the web address fb.me/HopeGraceELCA. Accolades to Jane Antholz and Erin Ebeler Rolf for their contributions.

Communion options were discussed. Communion could be performed in cars, in a drive through fashion. Also, discussed was allowing church members to do a walk through the church permitting members to receive communion and blessing. Another option would be to offer this outside weather permitting. This will be discussed further at the next church council meeting 21 April 2020.

The balcony wall was fixed for under the estimate amount (\$1980 after the company graciously donated the materials). The women of the church raised \$1600 that they donated to this project. To the Saints of the Nebraska Synod

"God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. Therefore we will not fear..." --Psalm 46

Dear Friends in Christ:

In a time such as this, in which threats with names like virus and recession are piled on top of countless other less-specific uncertainties, I call you to remember the promise of the Word in texts like that above. Beneath everything that feels unsure, we stand on the Good News of God's grace in Jesus Christ, and the assurance of his constant presence.

I'm writing to remind you of that truth, and because some have asked for clear guidance for a variety of matters. Please understand that what I share here isn't put forward as "commandments from the bishop," but as counsel from the synod's pastor. Every congregation, leader, and member will need to make thoughtful decisions appropriate to their situation. In the acknowledgement that I may be wrong, I offer the following counsel:

Not gathering for worship: while the information is not always clear or consistent and the temptation is strong to gather in person—we miss each other!—we have an obligation of love to our neighbor not to endanger her or him by violating guidelines put in place for the sake of the community's health. My desire to be with others does not trump the reality that I may be the source of another's infection. I urge congregations to follow community directives on avoiding or limiting gatherings until those directives are lifted.

Holy Communion practices: the Lutheran understanding of the Sacrament of the Table is that it is a bread-and-cup experience of Christ's presence in a flesh-and-blood gathering of his people. While deeply important to believers, it is not essential to salvation, and there are times when we may, voluntarily or otherwise, fast from receiving it. My counsel, affirming the guiding principles of the ELCA, would be simply not to celebrate the sacrament in any form until we are able to gather in person again. This is a truly exceptional time, and I recognize that congregations, in consultation with their pastors, may choose another practice for the duration of the current situation. Our pastoral leaders are well-trained theologians sensitive to ministry in their context. Trust them. And know that when "normal" returns, exceptional practices will no longer be necessary.

Offerings and finances: your congregation is even more reliant on your support when you can't gather in person. Now is the perfect time for your congregation to set up online options for receiving offerings—and of course one can always send a check in the mail. I urge congregations to prioritize staff salaries and benefits should decisions about expenses need to be made. Our office is working to stay abreast of help available for congregations through the Mission Investment Fund, the ELCA Credit Union, and other sources, as well as understanding what federal stimulus-related resources, if any, congregations might access. In this uncertain time, those of us with the means to do so need to step up our generosity, recognizing that there are those whose means have changed drastically. We are all in this together, and we share our burdens and our blessings.

Holy Week and Easter: the holiest time of our year is approaching, and we almost certainly will not yet be able to gather in person. Most of our congregations are finding ways to share worship online, by phone, or by mailing in-home worship resources to members. I'm certain this will be true for all of Holy Week and Easter. While we can't change the date of Easter, every Sunday is a celebration of the Resurrection, so if your congregation chooses to make the first Sunday you're able to gather again in person your celebration of Easter, with all the music, decoration, and festive elements of Easter Sunday, do so with joy.

Care for others: I am humbled and awed by the creativity and energy I see as members and congregations of this church invest themselves in innovative ways of staying connected with those most isolated and alone, providing food and more for those most negatively impacted, partnering with neighboring congregations to provide inspiration, encouragement, and worship, and so much more. Such faithfulness. Thank you, church—for being church!

Care for self: the radical shift in daily life is draining on all of us, and this new reality is going to stretch on for some time. Please, pace yourself. Limit your exposure to news, to social media, to anything that compounds uncertainty or distress. Breathe deeply. Take the time to pray. Be patient with yourself (and with those who live with you). Remember that you are God's beloved creation. Care for yourself as such.

We are all in this together—with one another and with the God we know most fully through the life, sufferings, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Be encouraged. Have hope. Know you are prayed for, cared about, and much appreciated.

The Nebraska Synod staff are here to serve and support to the best of our ability. We are committed to keeping you informed—while being sensitive to the vast amount of information being shared these days. Thank you for your prayers. Please know you are in ours.
