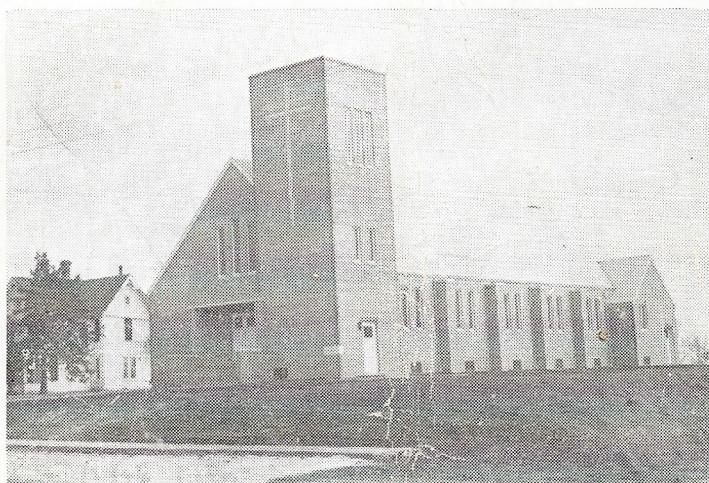

POSTLUDE



History of the Organization of Grace Lutheran Church



Grace Lutheran Church, of Cook, Nebraska, was formally organized at a meeting held on September 12, 1949. The constituency of this new congregation came from two congregations, both members of the American Lutheran Church, Central District. St. Paul Lutheran, Helena Precinct, was organized in the year 1866 and was in continuous existence at the same site, located four and one-half miles west of Cook, until the merger. Immanuel Lutheran, organization date not available, held services four miles northeast of Cook until 1892, when the congregation relocated in the village of Cook. It continued to exist as a congregation in that place until the time of the merger.

As the years passed, it became increasingly apparent that a merged congregation would be advantageous to both groups. This thinking first took concrete form, when on August 1, 1949, Immanuel Lutheran of Cook, through its council, extended to St. Paul, Helena Precinct, an invitation to enter negotiations, looking toward the organic merger of the two congregations.

As a result of this invitation, the councils of both congregations met jointly on August 22, 1949, and proposed merger plans were drafted.

Following this joint council meeting, each congregation met separately to ratify the action taken by their respective councils.

This having been accomplished, the two congregations met jointly on September 12, 1949. The action taken by the separate congregations was ratified without a dissenting vote, and the new congregation thus came into being. The name, Grace Lutheran Church, was selected by the newly organized group, which at that time consisted of approximately 325 baptized souls. The present Pastor, Rev. O. Lehman, was the first to serve in that capacity. He was ordained on June 18, 1950, and on June 25, 1950, was installed as the first regular Pastor of the new congregation.

History of the Building Program of Grace Lutheran Church

As soon as the merger became a reality, it was obvious to all that a new house of worship would have to be erected. The necessity of such action was recognized by the joint councils in their meeting on August 22, 1949. At a special meeting of the congregation, held on November 16, 1949, the motion was passed that a new church be constructed. The Church Council at this time was composed of: Fred Panko, Otis Grotrian, Louis Bentzinger, Arthur Riensche, Conrad Stutheit, Alfred Petersen, William Schmidt, Raymond Roesener, Alvin Ihde, and August Pieper. In January of 1951, Merle Riensche was chosen to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Arthur Riensche. The Building Committee was elected as follows: Jacob Oetken, Chairman, Herman Seeba, Treasurer, Theo. Riensche, and Fred Probst. Throughout the building program, these two groups have worked together, to coordinate activities, and to make the innumerable decisions that are inevitably connected with a building program.

The first step in the building program was the drive for funds, which was ably conducted by The Rev. F. Hefner, Syracuse, the supply Pastor, and the Building Committee. The goal had previously been set at \$60,000.00. This goal was reached in full within a week. The successful conduct of the drive was observed by a victory dinner, followed by a service of consecration of gifts, on March 8, 1950.

After careful consideration, the present site was selected and purchased, and the detailed planning for the structure was begun. By June of 1950, many of the important decisions had been made. Fritz Craig of Lincoln was selected to serve as architect, and the contract for the construction was awarded to Krumme and Sons, Arapahoe, Nebraska. Ground-breaking ceremonies were held on the morning of July 16, 1950. The actual work of construction was begun early in the fall.

When cold weather approached, it was deemed most advisable to suspend construction for the winter. During this period of cessation of actual construction, the Building Committee and the Church Council were active in securing many of the materials that would be needed upon resumption of work.

During the month of March, 1951, building operations were resumed. In spite of unfavorable weather conditions, progress was made, making possible the laying of the cornerstone on the afternoon of April 22, 1951. The Rev. R. Hanselmann of Burr served as the Liturgist, and The Rev. F. Hefner of Syracuse delivered the sermon.

In the months following the laying of the cornerstone, progress was slow due to continuing unfavorable weather. It was not until early fall that substantial progress could be made.

Since that time, however, with more suitable working conditions prevailing, the rate of construction increased considerably, and the building has now been substantially completed. Every member of Grace Lutheran rejoices over the successful completion of this undertaking, and is thankful that the Lord has permitted us to have it ready for the observance of the Christmas season.

Symbolism in the Nave Windows



The symbols in the nave windows were selected with definite ideas in mind. This brief explanation is offered to enhance your enjoyment of this beautiful work.

The ten windows on the south side of the nave demonstrate all of the important festivals and seasons of the Church Year. They are as follows, beginning at the south front:

1. **Advent**—A scroll with a Latin text, referring to the preparatory work of John the Baptist.
2. **Christmas**—The manger so typical of the nativity.
3. **Epiphany**—The five-pointed star, symbolizing the one which led the wise men.
4. **Lent**—The crown of thorns and the nails, depicting our Lord's Passion.
5. **Palm Sunday**—The crossed palms, representing the triumphant entry into Jerusalem. The cross and orb symbolize the victory of the Gospel.
6. **Good Friday**—Tradition states that the pelican, in times of famine, feeds her young with her own blood, and oftentimes loses her own life. Hence the idea of Good Friday.
7. **Easter**—The empty cross, and the rising sun, representing the women who went to the sepulchre early in the morning.
8. **Ascension**—The fiery chariot of Elijah, a type of our Lord's ascension.
9. **Pentecost**—The dove, a well-known symbol of the Holy Ghost.
10. **Trinity**—Design with Latin inscription, reading: Father is not Son: Father is God; Son is not Holy Ghost: Son is God; Holy Ghost is not Father: Holy Ghost is God.

The windows on the north side show in eight symbols a complete history of God's dealing with men. These too, begin at the front of the church, adjacent to the choir.

1. **Creation**—A scroll which contains the Hebrew text of Genesis 1:1.
2. **The Temptation and Fall**—The tree of Life, the fruit, the serpent.
3. **The Giving of the Law**—The two stone tablets on which the 10 Commandments were written.
4. **Messianic Prophecy**—The Messianic Rose representing the work of the Old Testament Prophets who kept the hope of the Saviour alive.
5. **John the Baptist**—The coat of camel's hair, symbolizing John, the last and the greatest of the prophets.

6. **The Lamb of God**—Symbolic both of our Lord's suffering as the Lamb of God (Agnus Dei) and his triumph over sin, death and the devil (The banner of victory).
7. **The New Testament Church**—The Church set on the solid foundation. "Other foundation can no man lay," I Corinthians 3:11.
8. **The Angel with Trumpet**—Symbolic of the end of the world and the judgment of the last day.

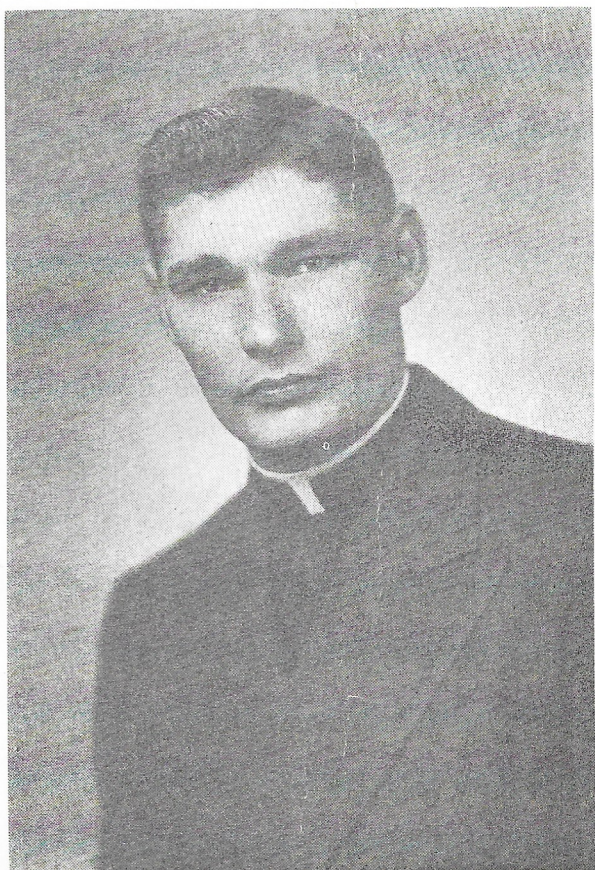
