



FIRST READING: Jeremiah 31:7-9

Thus says the LORD:

Sing aloud with gladness for Jacob,
and raise shouts for the chief of
the nations;

proclaim, give praise, and say,
"Save, O LORD, your people,
the remnant of Israel."

⁸See, I am going to bring them
from the land of the north,

**SECOND READING: Hebrews
7:23-28**

The former priests were many in
number, because they were prevent-
ed by death from continuing in of-
fice; ²⁴but he holds his priesthood
permanently, because he continues
forever. ²⁵Consequently he is able for
all time to save those who approach
God through him, since he always
lives to make intercession for them.

²⁶For it was fitting that we should
have such a high priest, holy,
blameless, undefiled, separated
from sinners, and exalted above the
heavens. ²⁷Unlike the other high
priests, he has no need to offer
sacrifices day after day, first for
his own sins, and then for those of
the people; this he did once for all
when he offered himself. ²⁸For the
law appoints as high priests those
who are subject to weakness, but the
word of the oath, which came later
than the law, appoints a Son who
has been made perfect forever.

GOSPEL: Mark 10:46-52

As [Jesus] and his disciples and a
large crowd were leaving Jericho,
Bartimaeus son of Timaeus, a blind
beggar, was sitting by the roadside.
⁴⁷When he heard that it was Jesus of
Nazareth, he began to shout out and
say, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy
on me!" ⁴⁸Many sternly ordered him
to be quiet, but he cried out even
more loudly, "Son of David, have
mercy on me!" ⁴⁹Jesus stood still
and said, "Call him here." And they
called the blind man, saying to him,
"Take heart; get up, he is calling
you." ⁵⁰So throwing off his cloak,
he sprang up and came to Jesus.
⁵¹Then Jesus said to him, "What do
you want me to do for you?" The
blind man said to him, "My teach-
er, let me see again." ⁵²Jesus said to
him, "Go; your faith has made you
well." Immediately he regained his
sight and followed him on the way.
